BURGLARY IN THE COUNTRY

Eudunda March 11. This morning when Mr. PA Gosling, general storekeeper, of this town, went to open his premises he found that they had been broken into during the night. The

police were informed and Mounted Constables McArthur, Miller and Wegner are making enquiries. The burglar first smashed a window but it is apparent, he did not enter by that means. A heavy iron crowbar, belonging to Messrs Edwin Davey & Sons, millers, was found in the next yard, and the marks on the two back doors showed that they were "jimmied" open with it.

The till from the grocery side was discovered near the back door, and the contents, about 10/6 pence in small change had gone. The drapery till & the iron safe containing a large amount of money, were not interfered with. Mounted Constable McArthur & Miller tracked a man's footprints from the mill along the railway line at the back of the town until a blind lane was reached, passing Messrs AC Wiesner & R Fritsch's house. The latter gentleman heard his dog bark furiously at 2am. The tracks then led to the back of Mr. Goslings shop. The police say that the work appears to be that of an amateur, and an early arrest is expected.

NEALES FLAT CFS

A group of 26 interested landholders met in the Neales Flat church Hall on the 15th August 1975 to express their concern at the lack of fire fighting facilities within their area. This meeting was presided over by Mr. A.S.K. Holding who at the time was the Fire Supervisor for the District Council of Eudunda. Mr. Holding explained to those present that Eudunda was shortly to receive a new unit. When this occurred it was then likely that the Council would allow the surplus 1943 Austin unit to come to Neales Flat provided it could be housed and maintained properly. A motion was passed to ask the Council to allow the unit to come to Neales Flat. A committee was formed -Wally Hage (President), Allen Kleinig

(Secretary), with further members Vin Diener, Paul Schiller and Paul Heidrich. This was the beginning of the Neales Flat Country Fire Service.

(An extract of the Neales Flat CFS History.) **NEALES FLAT CFS** Dec 20 1978

Several years ago the former Eudunda CFS unit was placed at Neales Flat and since then has been maintained by the people of that district.

However last month it was discovered that the old pump had a broken shaft and it was decided that a new pump be purchased immediately and fitted.

IDISTRICT COUNCIL CENTENARY FEATURE

IN THE BEGINNING THERE WAS WATER..... by Jim Reese

Eudunda-Cowi - "water from the ground," the spring that gave the town its name. Where once those quiet natives rested, where over 100 years ago those drovers watered their herds enroute to the markets of Adelaide and Kapunda, the springs that for nearly 50 years were the life giving fluid of the town, are now broken and empty save for a tiny trickle. Sheep graze on its edges and all is once more peaceful. But within vision of them life does continue, Eudunda thrives - no longer dependent on its springs - the spring that gave its name to our town. What other names have been left with us to remember or simply to forget? Who were those people whose names are perpetuated in the streets of Eudunda? John Hannan, the founder and by repute the namer of the town leaves his name for posterity. Ward, aptly named for a street in which a hospital is situated: but who was Ward? Ebenezer Ward was a politician and a close friend of William Oldham, the surveyor of Eudunda. It was Ward who in 1872 published the first newspaper in Kapunda, the Kapunda Evening News.

Lloyd. Allan and Laurence were all members of the Wiesner family, the family responsible for the subdivision of Maryville in Eudunda west. Michael St and Hambour Ave are like Hannan, the only streets which are named after true citizens and benefactors of the town. Michael being named in memory of Don Michael, a past chairman and member of parliament for the district, and Hambour Ave in appreciation of the huge part, the late George Hambour, like Mr. Michael a past chairman of council and MP, played in the progress and future planning of Eudunda.

As for Bruce, Gunn, Wiegall and Barwell Sts here is a situation that hopefully would never happen in this day and age.

Stanley Melbourne Bruce was Prime Minister of Australia when the street was renamed from Repass Rd: King William St became Gunn St, after the then leader of the opposition in the SA parliament, North West Bend Rd. became Wiegall St commemorating the Governor of SA, Sir Archibald Wiegall K.CMG and a street un-named became Barwell St named by a patriotic council after Sir Henry N Barwell MP, Premier of South Australia. It is perhaps with some pride for Eudunda that Hill St, named after a man who did little toward the establishment of Eudunda, was thus named.

John Hills claims to fame are many - firstly he was also a friend of William Oldham, secondly, as a boatswain, he came to SA in 1836 aboard HMS Buffalo, and who, with Henry Morns, nephew of Governor Hindmarsh and first chairman of the District Council of Julia, moved to Kapunda to assist Oldham in his employment us Mines manager and surveyor.

From the Eudunda Courier and Murray Flats Advertiser Thur July 13 1922 Little

Who and Why Gustav?

When Eudunda celebrated 125 years of white settlement in 1995, local artists Jim and Ronda Dunstan formulated the idea of figurines to depict characters of early pioneer days in Eudunda.

Gustav and his Dog were the first to appear. Jim and Ronda named Gustav after one of the fictional characters in a Colin Thiele book (Sun on the Stubble and Uncle Gustav's Ghost). The Dunstans then went on to do workshops with the Community and Schools making many more such figurines. The original Gustav and his Dog moved around the town to different locations, and have now become identifiable with the 125-year celebration.

When the Eudunda Heritage Committee first assembled its collection in the old Weisner Building (the two story former emporium in the South West corner of the Railway Parade and Kapunda Street Junction) Jim and Ronda gave the figurines of Gustav and his Dog to that body of people.

The Eudunda Family Heritage Committee adopted Gustav and his Dog as its official logo in acknowledgement of our District's hardworking Pioneers and their faithful four legged offsiders.

This year, 2003, after extensive consultation with the community, Eudunda Community Business and Tourism Association (ECBaT) also adopted Gustav and his Dog, as part of the Eudunda logo. Eudunda - Valley of Hidden Treasures is the slogan, which accompanies the picture.
