Welcome to our May newsletter.

We shall be celebrating History Week from 21st to 30th May. This year we are recognising and acknowledging the Buildings and Shops of our Town. We are very lucky to still have so many of our wonderful old buildings; much of our main street is as it was many years ago.

Up until 'Just Shearing' moved into 13 Bruce Street (in 2008), the shop had previously and continuously, since opening in 1887, been a barber or hairdressing salon. Handke's Butcher is another example of this continuation of businesses. Handke's Bruce Street shop has operated as a butcher since opening in 1887. Their Gunn Street premises were opened by A. Wittorff, butcher, in 1878.

Many of us spend a lot of time in our main street, but when was the last time you actually looked at our buildings?

Have you looked up and seen some of the lovely facades of the buildings? There is art deco moulding, different parapets, and wrought iron work. The repainted Wiesner sign looks fantastic.

Don't forget, both Fridays in History Week, (21st & 28th) hot soup will be on sale from the Heritage Rooms. The proceeds from the sale of the soup on the 28th May will go to the Cancer Council, as our contribution to 'The Greatest Morning Tea'.

MRS APPELT'S DIARY continued

(1904)

May 1: My husband has opened a branch business at the other end of town.

May 10: Mr and Mrs Hoskings the banker are leaving.

June 1: Made wurst today, 40 leberwurst, 46 blutwurst and 36 mettwurst, we paid 4d a pound for the pig.

June 2: Made sausage again today. June 26: The children are going for a drive, mushroom hunting.

June 27: The teacher's birthday today. The children gave him a suitcase and he gave them coffee and cake.

July 23: Vida and I drove to Dutton today. We used 'Duke' and Pastor Nickel's buggy. The roads were bad and it took us three hours to get there.

August 20: Governor Le Hunte came through Eudunda today, but he only showed himself as the train was leaving.

September 13: Mr A Keache's tender to build our new school has been accepted.

September 21: 2,500 people were at Eudunda Show today, the store was very busy and Mr Haeveker helped us.

October 5: It is 'Schulprufung' (school visiting day) in Neales today.

October 20: I sold a calf for 7/6 today.

November 10: Mrs Schupelius' funeral today. There were 52 buggies and two horsemen in the procession.


December 17: Nice rain. The farmers don't want it just now, but we must be satisfied with things as they are.

December 25: Christmas day. A lovely festival, all are happy. We all went to church.

December 31: It's a dreadful day 110' in the shade and a hot wind and so much dust that one can scarcely see. Many hundreds of rabbits are said to have died as the result of the heat.

Wiesner & Company

_(now Helen James Studio)*

Wiesner & Company, ironmongers, timber and hardware merchants, was one of the principal business places of Eudunda.

The premises were of an imposing character, two-storey additions having been made which were used as showrooms, and splendidly lighted.



These were reached both by lift and staircase, the total floor space being about 6,500 square feet, which contained a large assortment of furniture of all kinds. The firm obtained its goods from one of the largest furniture factories in the state, where only the very best seasoned timber was used and the highest class workmanship put into the manufacture.

Large importations included pianos and sewing machines- notably the 'Veritas and the 'Stella'- and general furniture.

The immense stock embraced drawing room, dining room, bedroom, and kitchen furniture, and household

requisites, ironmongery of all classes, comprising hardware, earthenware, cutlery, tin ware, glassware, clocks, watches, electro ware, wallpapers, lamps; also fancy goods, stationery, cigars, tobacco etc.

Building materials of all kinds were always on hand at Adelaide prices, farm and other appliances, wire netting, blacksmiths' and carpenters' tools; while a specialty was made of guns and all sporting-materials.

Messrs Wiesner also dealt largely in superphosphate fertilizers, the turnover in 1906 being about 300 tons.

They were agents for the Australian Implement Company, J.S. Bagshaw & Sons, Royal Fire Insurance Co., and Basedow, Eimer & Co.

Johannes Gottlieb Wiesner, the first proprietor of the business, opened 1890.

Gosling Store

(now Eudunda Family Heritage Gallery Rooms)*



Arthur E. Gosling while still a boy, gained experience in the general storekeeping trade in the northern districts of the State.

Mr Gosling subsequently became connected with the business of Charles Moore, drapery merchant, of Adelaide. In 1889 he came to Eudunda and established the general emporium which was favourably known throughout the district.

The gentleman took a keen interest in the progress of all movements pertaining to the advancement of Eudunda, and was for four years a member of the Neals District Council.

Arthur E. Gosling ran his emporium from 1902 until 1920

Shopping in the 1950s

At one o'clock on Tuesday during the school holidays you'd dress up to come shopping. We'd come in by cara little Vauxhall. We used to do our shopping at the top end. There was the baker, the greengrocer, the hairdresser, the butcher, the SAFU cream factory, the stock and station agent, the post office, H.O. Leditschke's garage, Mr Woidt's general store that sold everything from hobnail boots to safety pins, and Mrs Knight's- they had twelve kids. And there was the pub. We'd only come down the main street if we had to buy shoes or clothes. And then we'd go to Hambours and Eudunda Farmers. Margaret Doecke #

Rabbit Cannery*

Seventy three men from the Eudunda district went to Parliament House as a deputation and were responsible for the passing of the 'Rabbit Destruction Act of 2/2/1877'.

When Mr David Moody was elected to the House of Assembly in 1878 along with Messrs James White and James Shannon, the topic of the rabbit plague was the main conversation of the district amongst the farmers and graziers.

This led to a Cannery Works being built at 'Mount Misery', near Eudunda on section 107, Hundred of Neales.

Trappers and small boys were engaged to trap the rabbits. The industry flourished but the scarcity of rabbits 'forced the closure of the factory'.

In 1902 a travelling circus performed for the workmen at the Cannery on some ground which had been levelled for an arena. [Sadly little remains of the Rabbit Cannery, ed]

Memoirs of Leslie Charles (Bob) Nicholson



Many businesses have changed hands over the years. The names remembered are: Dan Tierney in 1910, haircuts 6d, shave 3d. Alf Asser, Frank Mercer, J.H. Wookey, Alf Neal, Alf Post, Vin Geyer, and another referred to as 'Old Frieze'. Alf Neal in the earlier days opened a shop in opposition to J.H. Wookey, on the opposite side of the street in the 'bottom end' of the town.

Alf Neal later barbered at the 'top end' for some time in the shop next to Schultz's old butchers shop. 'Old Frieze' was a barber at this end of town also. Vin Geyer had his hairdressing salon at the 'top end' next to Goldsbrough Mort, which used to be Leditschke's Show Rooms, later he moved to the main street area.

Bill (J.W.) Caddy was a boot maker next to the Barber in the main street. At the back of his store he had a huge tub full of water for softening the leather. Paul Stapleton (Snr) was also a boot maker.

Later Mr Con Haseloff had a fully stocked grocery shop with stacked shelves which seemed to stretch to the ceiling and reached by a ladder. These two buildings, known as the Michalk Buildings were built by Paul Michalk during the depression.



The National bank was the first bank in Eudunda, followed by the Savings

Bank which was situated in Gunn Street. (This building was like a 'dungeon'). Mr Rawolle helped with the building of the present Saving Bank.

The Commercial Bank was the third Bank which was located in the building now Westpac [now Kath's Gallery, ed]

The Police Station was located where Mrs Rawolle now lives [Pam Dutschke's, ed]. In 1880-1890's prisoners were tied to a post or tree as no cells were available.

Blacksmiths were Klaebe. This was the largest business of all. Klaebe did general blacksmithing and also made cultivators. Others were Jansen, Krummel and Reinhold Mibus; Tony Maylin was a wheelwright and shoesmith.

Weckert and Marston were the printers in Eudunda before N.W. Baehnisch.

Wiesner & Co. sold timber in the building across the road from their premises, they sold furniture and hardware in their two-storeyed building, it was a very busy business in its heyday.

It was later sold to M. Mattei, then M. Warner. [Helen James Studio, ed]. Klaebe built the two-storeyed building across from the Eudunda Hotel/Motel. It was a huge drapery and grocery store, much better than the E.F.C.S. and also sported delivery vans, but as E.F.C.S. grew Klaebe's dwindled.

Sample rooms for commercial travelers in drapery, were located in the shed

behind the Royal Hotel [Light Hotel, ed].

The samples would arrive by train in large tin trunks and be displayed for a week. The commercial travelers would contact all the stores, Klaebe, F.G.E. Appelt, Oscar Kamm, Berkholz, Gosling and E.F.C.S. to come and view the goods.

McLeods present site was originally a garage, who the builder was is unknown, but in my time Ben Weis and Colin Orrock were the proprietors.

Colin Orrock built a plane in the building, a moth, and lost his hand when swinging over the propeller to start it.

Herb Ziersch and Dick Duldig followed in the 1920's, later Bip Wagner, a tyre agent; J.C. Woodward, Steve Richardson, Harry and Phil Smith and Jack Knight had an agency for skins and tyres.

Paul Severin was the District Clerk, undertaker and carpenter. Mrs Severin gave millinery classes. Mr Julius Rohde was also an undertaker and carpenter.

Bill Both's carpenter's shop was in the building which was P. Pollard's second Wheat Barn, located near the old Courier office. Dietrich Both was a very good builder and carpenter.

Building lime came from E.R. Wilksch's kiln, Bower.

Miss Emma Pfitzner was a dressmaker. She had a little dim shop with a yellowing globe in her workroom which was located in Bruce Street.

The Neales council office was a small room in Paul Severin's house where people would go to pay their rates etc. Council meetings were held in a room of the Radestock's Hotel.

Goslings had the drapery and grocery shop where Hambours now are [Eudunda Family Heritage Gallery Rooms, ed].

In the 1920's the ladies section became a chemist store owned by Strempel and Jolly. Later came Arthur C. Holloway in the same premises. Cecil David Nichols followed Holloway.

In the present chemist building, Hyde, McKee and Walkley have operated. Dentists have been Duncan and Schoff.

Doctors Feige, Purvis, Mattison, Thomas, Brookman, Bowering and Kearney have attended the medical needs of the community. I recall Doctor Thomas driving his brown single seater T-Ford.

Elder Smith & Co Ltd premises were situated on the site of Schultz's butcher shop. In 1916 I recall paying a cattle account at Elder Smith's for my father with 63 gold sovereigns taken from a calico bag mother had made.

For lighting of the street corner posts, Albert Rohrlach, who worked at E.

Davey's flour mill [Laucke Mill, ed], went around fuelling with carbide and lighting them.

This was a practice about 1912. Some were situated at Mann's Hotel, Paech's Hotel, opposite the old post office, G. Weckerts corner and the corner of Bruce and Barwell Streets.


There were two butter factories, one owned by Taylor Bros from Gawler. The factory in the main street was originally built by J Woolston from Mt Mary in 1917-18. He was a jeweler, later followed by J.A.T. Freund and Eric Freund. Mr Mitchelson was the manager and cream tester.

Taylor's also collected eggs and held carcass competitions, besides processing the cream. Herb Ziersch occupied the building later as a general agency and carcass competitions were still held.

A fire occurred in Edwin Davey's flour mill in the 1920's and the boiler lay in the yard for 50-60 years.

Oscar Kamm's store (CWA rooms) was literally packed with goods. C.F. Leditschke (CFL Stores) later occupied this building, Bert Woidt drove a van for CFL to Brownlow, later the CFL Stores moved to Berkholz Buildings. Rohdes's Newsagency formerly Berkholz

John C. Woodward had a café opposite the Eudunda Institute and later it was occupied by Wagner's and Lou Goedecke.

People would have refreshments there when Balls and Social functions were held in the hall.

Centenary Buildings [Eudunda Hardware, ed] used to be a Government betting agency with Wuttke as the agent. The other Government betting shop was next to Schultz's butchery.

Later the Centenary buildings were occupied by Paul Stapleton (jr) with his electrical shop and Allan Stapleton had a shoe shop.

R.J. Nicholls newsagent was located where Hambours store room now is. His father Tom Nicholls was a saddler in the 1880's and Reg still sold some leather goods in later years.

Baker Schultz had a delivery van and he travelled out of Eudunda. Elliot as a child bought delicious buns from his van.

Other bakers were Oscar Traeger, Tommy Harrison and Matz. In late 1951 the wheat sheds which were in the railway yards blew down when a whirlwind hit town.

Coles saleyards were located where the present police station is and Eldersmith & Co yards were located near McLeods.

The stock trucking yards opposite the mill were transferred to the south end of the railway yard, this area were then made into town gardens and a war memorial was constructed.

Elliott's Store

(now Lifetime Books)


This business was taken over by Frank Elliott from the Shepards. It was operated by Frank, Allan, Irene, Doris and Audrey, all of the Elliott family.

Frank was appointed to the position of Clerk and Overseer, District Council 1933. Late 1934 saw the operation altered to Elliott Bros being Wilfred and Allan. At that time Wilfred and wife Laura were conducting a mixed business in Riverton (the home of the Elliott family) which was sold and they moved to Eudunda.

A change came again in 1936 when Allan decided on school teaching, leaving Wilfred to carry on for approximately 10 years. Late 1946 Wilfred was joined by son (Spen).

During the period to 1969 they changed the name to Elliotts. Other types of operations undertaken included school transport.

Reluctantly because of age and ill health December 1969 brought the period of operation to a close.


