

COMMUNITY HISTORY PORTAL

As a community museum or related history organisation, History SA offered us a unique opportunity to be included in a Directory within their new Community History portal. The South Australian Tourism Commission also intends using this information to feed into their database used by tour companies the world over. This marked increase in our online presence will surely boost visitor numbers to Eudunda as well as promote interest in our state's rich history.

We were asked to submit information regarding the gallery and the history of the building together with contact details and the following will appear in the directory they are compiling for their website.

The Eudunda Family Heritage Gallery moved to its existing building in 1999, and with items donated by the community, have built up a wonderful collection of items featuring Family History trees and memorabilia of our early pioneer settlers together with displays of locally made early farming equipment, photographs and objects from the local railway, hospital, schools, churches and much more.

The complex also includes the 1880s Gosling Cottage, named after its first resident Arthur E Gosling who owned a drapery store in Eudunda.

Wander through this beautifully restored cottage and be amazed at

some of the items you find there from the town's history.

From 1889 to 1902 the two shops making up the Eudunda Family Heritage Gallery were owned by Charles Moore & Co., drapers, and managed by Arthur Gosling who the owned the business till 1920. His son P.A. Gosling took over in that year.

The shop to the left (No. 17) was briefly H.D.Weil's Florist from 1924 and then a Chemist shop 1927-50. The other shop (No. 19) was shared with C.B. Secomb (Chemist) 1920-26 before M.Hambour (later Hambours Ltd) occupied it from 1926-91 and combined both shops 1950-91.

The 1990s saw a number of occupiers with a newspaper office in the smaller shop (No. 17) for most of the time.

In 1999 the Eudunda community with assistance from Regional Council of Goyder bought both premises and with the aid of hard working volunteers developed the Eudunda Family Heritage Gallery.

If you would like help researching your family history tree and believe your ancestors settled in the area, we have early cemetery records of Eudunda and the surrounding district you could explore.

Allow an hour or so when you come into the gallery to fully appreciate all we have on display and for groups of 25 or more, guided tours and luncheon can be arranged by prior bookings. '

Market Days in Eudunda back in the 1940's by Ora Jenke

When I was a little girl I remember Sale Days as being a special day. It was the day that brought a lot of people to the town. We came to the sale in the morning about half an hour before it started so we could either unload what we had for sale or have a look at what you might like to buy. It was fascinating for a young child to see ducks, chooks, maybe some young turkeys in cages, pet rabbits, guinea pigs or ferrets and to see pigs, sheep, cows and calves, and even a horse and a bull.


When the truckie wanted to transport the animals to the train truck to send them by rail to the abattoirs in Adelaide the bull escaped. He ran into the Weisner shop and caused havoc because Weisner's had glassware displayed in the front of the shop. The Saleyards were where the Police Station now is.

My parents would stay for most of the day. After the do our shopping and catch up with friends and have a good chat.

We left for home in enough time for us to pack away the shopping, feed the animals and milk the cows.

We children were allowed a treat. Maybe a penny or three penny ice cream or ice block and a few lollies.


10 kms SE of Eudunda. Follow the Truro Road turn off at Foote Rd and continue on until you turn into Neales Road, Neales Flat.

HISTORIC PLAQUES

The Regional Council of Goyder, through its Heritage Advisory Committee and its Tourism Working Party has received from SA History a grant to assist in the celebration of the 175th Anniversary of the Foundation of South Australia. This grant is being used to place 30 vitreous enamel plaques on places of historic and heritage significance across the Council area.

We were invited to submit applications for 6 public buildings of historic interest within Eudunda and in the interest of historical accuracy to provide sound evidence for the statements that would appear on the plaques. The following applications were submitted and approved for plaques-

Eudunda Family Heritage Gallery Eudunda District Hall (formerly Century Hall) Eudunda Club St. Hilda's Church (formerly St. Trinitatis) Flour Mill Centenary Gardens

Sale Day

What a day when Coles sale day was on in Eudunda once a month. People from all the surrounding districts flocked to the town and brought calves, pigs, cattle, horses, chooks and ducks and pigeons to sell, plus any furniture and household goods you no longer needed, just to make a bit of money coming in.

It was a full days outing for our family, where you met lots of people and had a good chat. We lived about 8 miles out of town. It was a special day when Hambours sale was on as well. A lot of people gathered at the door before 9.00am to get the best bargains when the shop opened.

Sale day was bedlam, it was opposite the Commercial Bank and the Royal Hotel, you could hear the auctioneer yelling the prices out. There were the pig yards, sheep, cattle, horses. Big area with seats all around, all in the middle of the town.

Coles brothers had the sale and the trucking yards by the mill. They'd have fellows herding beasts up there. Bulls, cattle might get away from them down the main street. You'd hear the crack of the whip, and then all night bellowing. I can remember being in the street one day when one of these animals got away, the men on horses would round them up.

I can remember people queuing up for lunch at Bert Schultz's bakery. It was a real day out. They had tables and chairs and people queuing up.

Elliots served hot meals on sale days.

On Barwell Street there'd be cars lined up on both sides of the street. Up by the churches that was all chock a block with cars. That was up to the 1940's.


Your uncle used to come up from Morgan with fish, oranges, watermelon. He came up in an old buckboard and set up by the Light Hotel. Just sell from the back of the truck. He'd come up with Murray cod and callop. Other people would come in with veggies too.

Sale day was the community day-and the show day. Sometimes they even sold sundries in the form of furniture.

There'd be a waiting room full of people at the doctors, queues at the legal office.

The day after sale day it wouldn't be worth opening the shop.

Mrs Appelts Diary 1907

January 26th: Meta Ziersch (maid) has left us. Anna Noack, P. Noack's wife arrived with her sick baby. Victor has gone to Bright with Eddie Hansen. It was a really joyous occasion for him. Vida had her first music lesson this year.

February 6th: Fridi, Victor, the girls and Anna Temme and Olga Baumann went for a picnic at Anlaby. Mrs Maerkert was here for the night. She has sold her farm.

March 31st: Vic Mackenzie has laid on gas in the shop, dining room and kitchen.

April 22nd: Have done the washing, mangling and ironing and everything is neatly put away. Vida is a good help, she is a dear girl. Emma Baumann is very obedient, we all love her.

May 23rd: Pastors left for Adelaide today. There were many people at the station to see Pastor off. Pastor seemed very moved but Mrs Nickel was very brave.

June 12th: Received a card from P. Nickel from Fremantle-addressed simply- the family Appelt, Eudunda. It is good there is only one Eudunda or it may have travelled all over the world. Vida came back from town after a most enjoyable time there. June 28th: Had the heaviest frost for 50 years yesterday. The country looked as it would after very heavy snowing, only the tops of the hills could be seen.


July 10th: My birthday. I feel sad and the weather is miserable.. Vida and Gus gave me a cover for the piano, Clara a nightdress satchel, Fridie a passage lamp and Papa a silk blouse and ornaments.

August 5th: Clara, Vida and I saw the comet (Hallets) this morning at 4.30 when we got up to wash.

September 30th: We are having a dreadful dust storm and were not able to hang out our washing. Gussie went to town to do some buying for the shop.

October 10th: Vida and I have influenza. Saw in the paper that Vida got honours in her theory of music exam. It was 3 years yesterday since our dear Mother died.

December 23rd: The girls are decorating the Christmas tree in the church and have choir practise.
