

Dear Mary Broughton,

As an old- time resident of Eudunda (I was born here in 1888), I would like to pass on some little known facts about the district, and offer a correction or two to some of the other correspondents.

Very few people know that Eudunda once had its own copper mine. This was on a property that was owned by my father (and later by me until I retired) and was situated 2 miles south of the town. The mine was worked before the railway to Eudunda was constructed and the ore was carted to Kapunda by bullock wagon. The teams by-passed the Eudunda township, crossing through Mr Gosden's property. In Kapunda, it was included with ore from the mine there which was transported by rail to the city. A strong water flow was struck in the shaft at 40 feet, but there was still a considerable amount of good quality ore above the water line when the Kapunda mine was closed. This mine was then forced to close also. When the mine was closed in by my father, water seeped out of the hill, and ran down a creek for about 2 miles, turning the wire blue and green whenever it touched a fence. To-day the only sign of the mine is a small patch in the paddock where nothing grows, although this is disappearing in time.

Many people have wondered why the railway line through Eudunda has a few unnecessary curves. It was planned to pass north of the town, but the flour miller, Mr Davey organised a partition amongst the setters to get the line past his mill. However part of the line was already built with a curve to the north where the race course is now. This was left, and the line was veered south to go through the town and then past his mill.

Dr Fiege did not own the first car. His was preceded by one owned by Mr Jim Gosden and what a noisy contraption it was - it could be heard about three miles away. The doctor incidently was a very good friend of my father's, and he called regularly at our place to buy chaff. My father at the time had an egg merchant business, and had three or four vans touring the district to collect eggs.

The first water laid on in the town came from a spring (it no longer flows) neat the property now owned by Mr Marcus Pfitzner. This was piped down the hill to the two hotels. The railway dam which was built when the railway was constructed, burst on two occasions, sending water cascading down the Morgan road. On one of these occasions people were finding crayfish as far as two miles down the road.

There was originally a cattle track half a mile wide to Morgan, and others went to Truro and Point Pass, but I do not think that these were as wide. These tracks were later subdivided into 20 acre workingman's lots leaving a three chain road. A condition of sale was that these blocks must be lived on, but many of these dwellings were no more than dugouts as some of the people who took the blocks up could not afford a normal house.

The Eudunda Club was built by a Mr. Sander (or Zander) and while he was building this he engaged Mr. Dietrich Both, who later became a prominent builder in the town.

Mr Paech who was one of the first members of Parliament in Eudunda, proposed bringing water from the Murray to Eudunda, but was howled down by the "experts"; who said it was impossible. How times have changed.
