June 7: Made 16 dozen bottles of stomach drops.

July 16: Literary Society farewelled Oscar Thamm.

September 18: Snowing.

October 8: Mr Grote the dentist extracted two of my teeth.

October 16: Drove to Anlaby to see Mr Dutton's beautiful garden.

October 23: Business is so very bad. November 1: Some town larrikins were throwing stones on the roof and opening and shutting the storeroom doors, making themselves objectionable. Fritz caught one and gave him a box behind the ears. Next day Mrs Berkholz came to tell him she was summonsing him for giving her son a black eye. With Mr Pfeiffer's help he managed to assuage her but it cost 10/- for the summons. December 22: Made 53 pounds of American plums from our tree into jam.

Our next newsletter will contain a special story on the Eudunda Red Cross, and what has been happening since Betty Dreckow wrote the following in Hills, Valley and Plains:

Eudunda Red Cross Branch

The Eudunda Red Cross Branch commenced in 1915 when Mrs Gosling was Secretary. No Presidents name can be found. Tracing information from old minute books revealed that in 1939 Mrs HD Michael was President and Mrs Muirhead Secretary, Miss Gwen Weisner Treasurer, and Mrs ML White Secretary.

There appears to be no information available from 1939-1943. When Mrs Michael liaised amongst town residents and country people collecting donations etc. An old docket to hand reveals that 191 face washers and 186 handkerchiefs were sent to Headquarters plus other items.

In 1954 the Branch really started to function on a regular basis and it is still quite active with 69 members. Looking back over old minutes it reveals that Mrs E Marr served as Secretary for 11 years and President for four years. Mrs J Knight also served quite a long term as Secretary and Mrs E Handke as Treasurer.

The Aim of Organisation

To work loyally within the provisions of the Royal Charter, for aid to sick and wounded of all nations, for assistance in public disaster, calamity or need, for improvement in health and the prevention of disease and for the mitigation of suffering.

Major events include – March Appeal, Baby Competition, Entertaining, Senior Residents prior to Christmas – not necessarily a Christmas Party, and Street Stalls. Every Christmas a basket of fruit is delivered to the Senior Citizens Hostel, biscuits to lonely and onlys, also to the District hospital.

In 1976 we were given the opportunity of running an Op. Shop by the Eudunda Apex Club who had given up running this worthy venture. Many dollars have been added to our Branch funds through the sale of good clean clothes – we also have a good venture going with garages and the foundry with sales of rags. These are taken from clothes not suitable for sale, so nothing is lost. We also provide rags to Inveraritys, so more dollars are added to our funds. Many generous folk man the Shop on a volunteer basis and this is appreciated very much.

Eudunda Bakery has also been responsible for many pints of blood being collected. Unfortunately, no more does the Blood Bank come to Eudunda and residents have to travel to Kapunda to give their pint. Members attend Regional Conferences, also functions held by other branches.

Mrs Pat Inglis was very helpful with Junior Red Cross members for many years. Meetings are held quarterly and Committee meetings when anything of importance arises. Many members have been presented with their Long Service Medals.

<u>Maps</u>

Presently we are copying and preserving some of our precious old maps. We are always looking for old maps of the district. Please could you look through cupboards and drawers and see if you have any. Maps with landholders marked on them would be wonderful. We are happy to copy them if you would prefer to keep the original.

One of the maps worth coming in to the Gallery to look at is the one of Anlaby Station (hanging in our meeting room).

In its day Anlaby ran 70,000 sheep and covered 160,000 acres. Very little of our area wasn't part of Anlaby Station. This year marks the 175th anniversary of Anlaby. The current owners are presently cataloging the historic garden, grounds and their paddocks and are finding some rare botanic gems.

One of the local district highlights were the garden parties held by Mr & Mrs Dutton in the wonderful Anlaby Station gardens. In 'Mrs Appelt's Diary' of 1912 (in this newsletter) we see: October 16 'Drove to Anlaby to see Mr Dutton's beautiful garden).

Coincidently the Anlaby gardens will be open to the public 24th & 25th October 2014 and it will be well worth taking the opportunity to relive those 'glorious' Dutton Garden Party days and see all the amazing work the present owners are putting in to do their best to ensure Anlaby Station will still be part of South Australia's, and our district's story for another 175 years. We are very fortunate to have such an incredible piece of living history on our doorstep!

The following excerpt has been taken from *Hills, Valley and Plains: History of the Eudunda District.*

The Rabbit Cannery

Seventy-three men from the Eudunda district went to Parliament House as a deputation and were responsible for the passing of the passing of the 'Rabbit Destruction Act of 2/2/1877'.

When Mr David Moody was elected to the House of Assembly in 1878 along with Messrs James White and James Shannon, the topic of the rabbit plague was the main conversation in the district among the farmers and grazers.

This led to a Cannery Works being built at 'Mt Misery', near Eudunda on Section 107, Hundred of Neales.

Trappers and small boys were engaged to trap the rabbits. The industry flourished but the scarcity of rabbits 'forced the closure of the factory'.

In 1902 a travelling circus performed for the workmen at the Cannery on some ground which had been levelled for an arena.

Peep Hill Church Part 3

Additional paraments were made later (with the exception of the red and black, which were added in the 1960's); and in 1955 a paraments box, in which they could be stored, was made by Bro. Zerna. Two years later Bro. and Mrs. 0. F. Materne presented a clergy chair as a memorial of thanksgiving; Mrs. Materne also donated two vases in 1958. In the following year the congregation attended to exterior maintenance. By such congregational and indicidual action the church was beautified and equipped more completely, as a continued expression of love for God's House.

During Pastor Röehrs's ministry the youth society was re-established (May 11, 1955) after having been in recess since the days of the Second World War; and a Ladies Guild was established in the latter part of 1957. With the institution of annual Parish Sundays, with a Parish Service in the morning, and the Annual Parish Meeting and a Parish Women's Day running concurrently in the afternoon, Peep Hill acted as the host in 1955. The necessity of conducting German services for the benefit of older members had lessened during the years since their re-introduction in the 194Os,but four services per annum were still conducted for their benefit until 1959.

After serving for 61/2 years, Pastor Roehrs in 1959 accepted a call to Canberra, ACT He was farewelled at the beginning of August. Before steps were taken to fill the vacancy, the Peep Hill congregation took part in the discussions between the two Point Pass parishes regarding a possible amalgamation. The discussions were commenced in August, and during their course the congregation decided to continue its connections with Point Pass. These discussions culminated in a combined meeting held on October 4, when the first call was issued by the amalgamated Point Pass parish. In addition to Peep Hill, the new parish consisted of the congregations of Point Pass (Immanuel and St. Peter's combined), Robertstown (St. John's and Zion combined), Apoinga, Geranium Plain, and Julia.

Pastor J. E. Materne took charge of all congregations in the interim period, being given some assistance by Pastor M.T. Renner, of Eudunda. In February, 1960, Pastor Materne took over his own new pastorate at Wangaratta, Victoria, and the recently graduated Pastor C. A. Dohler thereupon acted as locum tenens for one month.

The call to serve the amalgamated parish was accepted by Pastor H. F. W. Proeve, B.A.., of Nuriootpa, S. A., who transferred to Point Pass in March, 1960, and was installed there on the Second Sunday in Lent, March 13, by Pastor A. J. Lohe (of Immanuel Seminary), assisted by the Pastors H,W. R. Proeve (Stonefield) and

M. T. Renner (Eudunda). On the following Sunday he conducted his first service in Peep Hill. In the new parish Peep Hill shared the services conducted by the pastor on a fortnightly basis, in which early morning, later morning, and afternoon services followed in rotation, with evening services occasionally on the high festival days in place of daytime services.

The seventieth anniversary of church dedication was not allowed to pass by unnoticed. On September 25, the Fifteenth Sunday after Trinity, at its 11 a.m. service, the congregation had in its midst its former pastor, Pastor E. H. Proeve, of Waikerie, to remind it, on the basis of Psalm 22:22-23, that the purpose of commemorating the anniversary was "that God be praised". Pastor Proeve stressed the many reasons for thankfulness and praise, which have their centre in the grace of God, revealed to us through the Word and Sacraments; and he indicated that thankfulness can be expressed by working for the Kingdom of God through the congregation and its organisations.

Mindful of the fact that in five years' time this present three-quarter century anniversary would fall due, the congregation made unobtrusive improvements in 1960. The interior woodwork was painted a light colour, and the doors that had been retained between the nave of the church and the porch were removed.

In the year of its 70th anniversary the congregation numbered 76 baptized members and 55 confirmed members. These numbers remained fairly constant, and at the end of 1964 there were 74 baptized and 57 confirmed members.

Pastor Proeve's service in the congregation came to a close this year when he accepted a call extended by the Church Council of the Church to continue his duties as the Secretary of the Church in a full-time capacity in North Adelaide. Pastor Proeve conducted his farewell Parish Service at Robertstown on August 29; but served at Peep Hill once more on the following Sunday, September 5.

The call to serve the Point Pass parish has been accepted by Pastor Leo Paul Graetz, of Pinnaroo,S.A. In the meantime Pastor Hartley Hage, who has been in the service of the Lutheran Mission New Guinea, has taken over duties as locum teñens since September 12, and will, it is anticipated, be serving until the end of the year.

During the last few years the congregation has each year done something to its property, which in the wider sense belongs to the preparations for the 75th anniversary.

In 1962 the long-standing lime-content apron in front of the porch was replaced by a larger cement one, together with substantial paths around the walls of the church for their protection against moisture. The work was carried out by voluntary labour under the expert guidance of the brethren J. H. Jenke and E. G. Mader.

In the following year a large-scale improvement was made to the floor of the church. It was still the original floor, but the wear of more than 70 years had made it uneven. After the levelling of it, the surface was covered with Vynex tiles: dove-grey in the main body of the church, and in the porch; and silver with white in the sanctuary portion. The sanctuary portion and aisle were delineated by a narrower black flecked tile. The effect was very pleasing.

In 1964 the power lines of the Electricity Trust of South Australia were extended into the district. Fluorescent lighting was therefore installed in the church, and could be used for the first time at the Children's Service on Christmas Eve that year.

Projects have been carried out this year under the general guidance of the Maintenance Committee, the brethren A. K. Jenke, P. H. Jenke, and C. A. Sander. In the vestry the original lime floor has been replaced with a cement floor, this necessitated the provision of a new door frame. The interior of the vestry was repainted; and new cupboards have also been provided in it. In the church the ceiling has been painted in a light blue shade (it had previously been varnished wood), and the rest of the interior was repainted. The exterior woodwork and guttering received similar treatment. A new entrance gate, with suitable posts, has been provided for the church grounds; and a new fence has been erected along the eastern boundary of the cemetery.

The sisters have made themselves responsible for the provision of Red Cloud carpet in the sanctuary portion and as an aisle runner. The organ platform is also being covered with a carpet. The cleaning of the church, which for quite a number of years has been undertaken by the sisters, working according to a roster, will be made easier by the gift of an electric vacuum cleaner (by Mrs. J. Hahn).

This history, has been compiled at a point in the history of the congregation when it stands on the threshold of a new phase.

This applies in a local sense, as the congregation awaits the coming of its next shepherd, under whose guidance and care it will enter into its next guarter-century.

It also applies in a wider sense. When the congregation was established it belonged to the Evangelical Lutheran Immanuel Synod of South Australia. Thus at the amalgamation in 1921 it became a part of The United Evangelical Lutheran Church in Australia. Now, with the confident hope of another amalgamation, it looks forward to the not too distant day when its affiliation will be *with the Lutheran Church of Australia.

On the threshold of these developments our history must now pause, giving this encouragement to all members: Forward "in nomine Jesu" (in the Name of Jesus). Our prayer with and for the members of the church which bears the name of St. Michael and All Angels may well be summarised in the Third Petition of the Lord's Prayer; for we may bear in mind that in heaven the will of God is perfectly done by the angels. With this in mind we pray at this seventy-fifth anniversary:

"THY WILL BE DONE IN EARTH, AS IT IS IN HEAVEN."
